On March 23, 2017, the 11th Annual Legislative Breakfast was held at the State Capitol. Many Senators and Representatives came to meet and greet our members and share the aloha with some good food. Most of the HDA leadership and HDA Legislative program members were present to help President Dr. Chris Lee host the room to discuss upcoming legislative issues.

The 2017 Hawaii State Legislature completed its session in May 2017. During these sessions, HDA was successful on defeating bills that could have negatively impacted the health and safety of Hawaii patients, for example increasing reciprocity without adequate assurance of recent hands-on training.

Bills introduced in 2017 but not passed, will be back in 2018 such as Adult Medicaid and Water Fluoridation. Legislators will again consider dentistry-related bills in January 2018, the second year of the legislative biennium.

Great effort was made to defeat bills by more than 100 dentists submitting testimony at the state legislature. This was an outpouring of support for HDA's legislative effort, chaired by Dr. Norman Chun and the HDA Legislative Committee.

The Haveii Dental Association supported three bills, all of which were signed into law.

The Hawaii Dental Association supported three bills, all of which were signed into law by Governor Ige before the July 11 deadline. These bills can be read in full at www.capitol.hawaii.gov/:

 HB374 (now Act084): requires the state auditor's office to study whether Hawaii dental assistants should be regulated, such as requiring certification. HDA leaders supported this bill as an alternative to simply banning dental assistants from applying fluoride and to potentially advance the caliber of dental assistants in the state. HDA leaders have met preliminarily with the State Auditor Les Kondo and the lead investigator who are reviewing the existing rules regarding dental assistants and determining whether regulation is necessary to advance the public's health and safety.

HB561 (now ACT106): requires dentists who administers general anesthesia, deep sedation, or moderate (conscious) sedation to post contact information to verify licensure and authorization to administer anesthesia or perform sedation. This bill specifies requirements, including inspections, for written authorization or permit to administer anesthesia or sedation.

HB563 (now Act083) allows dental hygienists to work under "general" (rather than "direct") supervision of a dentist in certain situations. This bill will allow dental hygienists to perform non-irreversible procedures on a dentist's patient of record pursuant to a treatment, provided that the hygienist may not perform intra-oral block anesthesia unless under direct supervision. HDA supported this bill because it will allow, but not require, dentists the greater flexibility in managing the patients under their care and continue to help ensure public safety.
